

We at your Constabulary hope that your summer was a good one as we welcome the fall season. Be mindful that our children will be going back to school so drive safely. In this issue I would like to talk about DOMESTIC VIOLENCE which was derived from Crime in America and what you can do about it.

Domestic abuse also known as spousal abuse, occurs when one person in an intimate relationship or marriage tries to dominate and control the other person. An abuser doesn't "play fair". They use fear, guilt, shame and intimidation to wear you down and in order to gain complete power over you. They may threaten you, hurt you, or hurt those close to you. Domestic abuse that includes physical violence is called domestic violence.

APPLICANTS MUST BE AT LEAST 18 YEARS OLD AND REGISTERED TO VOTE IN SULLIVAN COUNTY. THE BOE ESPECIALLY NEEDS POLL WORKERS FLUENT IN WRITTEN AND SPOKEN SPANISH. VOTER REGISTRATION

PRIMARY ELECTION

Mail Registration

Applications must be postmarked not later than August 16th and received by a board of elections not later than August 21st to be eligible to vote in the State/Local Primary Election.

In Person Registration

You may register at your local board of elections or any state agency participating in the national voter Registration Act, on any business day throughout the year but, to be eligible to vote in the State/Local September primary, your application must be received no later than August 16th.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Notices of change of address from registered voters received by August 21st by a county board of elections must be processed and entered in the records in time for the primary election.

GENERAL ELECTION

Mail Registration

Applications must be postmarked not later than October 11th and received by a board of elections not later than October 16th to be eligible to vote in the General Election.

In Person Registration

You may register at your local board of elections or any state agency participating in the National voter Registration Act, on any business day throughout the year but, to be eligible to vote in the November general election, your application must be received no later than October 11th except, if you have been honorable discharged from the military or have become a naturalized citizen since October 11th, you may register in person at the board of elections up until October 25th.

Change of Address

Notices of change of address from registered voters received by October 16th by a county board of elections must be processed and entered in the records in time for the general elections.

STAR Registration Program - coming soon

The New York State

Department of Taxation and Finance

- Andrew M. Cuomo - Governor
- Thomas H. Mattox - *Commissioner*

New legislation requires all homeowners receiving a Basic STAR exemption to register with the New York State Tax Department in order to receive STAR exemptions in 2014 and subsequent years.

Homeowners will not have to register in order to receive their 2013 STAR exemptions.

This is part of a new initiative to protect New Yorkers against the costs of inappropriate or fraudulent STAR exemptions.

Senior citizens

The registration will only apply to Basic STAR recipients. Seniors receiving Enhanced STAR are not affected by the new registration requirement.

Seniors must, however, continue to:

- apply annually, or
- participate in the Income Verification Program.

Do nothing now

New York State Department of Taxation and Finance will mail all Basic STAR recipients information on when and how to register.

Penalties

To support the registration effort, the following new penalties, sanctions, and fees have been enacted:

- penalties for intentionally providing misinformation to an assessor will increase from \$100 to as much as \$2500
- the number of years for which a taxpayer must repay inappropriate STAR benefits will increase from three to as many as six years
- taxpayers whose STAR exemption is revoked will be unable to receive the exemption for six years after the revocation
- an additional \$500 processing fee will be imposed whenever an inappropriate exemption granted after April 1, 2013 is revoked

The processing fees and penalties will be retained by local governments, while the State will recover the value of the STAR benefits provided to ineligible taxpayers.

The Anatomy of a Rescue

To begin my story, I'd like to set the guidelines. First off, the story is true. But second, and most important, we operate to the scope of our training. The resources are abundant in our surrounding communities, and when we all get together, we are a powerful and skilled team.

Ok, now that that's done lets set the stage. Lumberland has been very busy this summer. Since July 1, we responded to over 60 emergency calls. August 22 was no different. And so begins a day I am not going to forget any time soon.

We had already responded to two calls in the morning. Around 1:30 the siren once again blew for an odor of propane. I met up with Terry at the firehouse, geared up, and hopped on the engine to respond. As we were pulling out of the bay, another call came in for "a fall victim at 431 Rt. 31" Terry and I agreed I would go to the medical call and he would proceed with the engine to the propane call. I got in the drivers seat of the ambulance knowing that Charlie and Bosco were dividing themselves to help at both calls. Now I thought I was responding to a fall victim at a residence. No biggie. As I proceeded down Rt. 31, I quickly realized *there was no 431 Rt. 31!* Jay had already met up with me in his vehicle and Charlie was right behind us. Then a queer thing happens. Jimmy Bisland is standing in the road flagging us down. "Oh, I think, the fall victim must've tried to go to the hospital in their own vehicle and stopped and are by Jimmy", "No problem". So Jay, Charlie and I pull over by Jimmy and he tells us the fall victim is actually a fisherman and is about a mile in the woods on the Mongaup. And of course I say the perfect thing, "*A real mile????*" I truly was not expecting THAT kind of fall victim or this kind of rescue. Jimmy says "yes, lets go, I'll take you to him". The nephew of the fisherman found the road and had flagged Jimmy down. Jimmy had already walked in once!

We quickly decide Charlie was to stay as command and Jay grabbed a medical bag, I grab a portable radio and we follow Jim. We skitter down a steep embankment, zigzag over ridges and over two ravines. It really was doggone near a mile until we found the nephew and hapless fisherman. He had fallen from the very, very narrow foot path, more like deer path and seriously injured, possibly fractured his hip. Problem was, he fell eight feet straight down on the rivers edge, feet in the water sitting on a rock and hands in front of him holding a tree limb. Rapids cascading right next to him. His nephew said it took an hour to wrangle him up to the rock.

We sized up what we needed and it was decided I would stay and Jay would run back to get the Orange County Technical Rescue Team and Highland Lake Fire Dept. to bring life jackets and more medical equipment that I had wanted. I remember Jimmy asking me if Jay would get lost going back. I knew he would not. Jay wound up running back and forth escorting people to us six times!

Now remember I said I had my bunker pants and boots on? Well, I needed to get down to my cold, tachycardia and injured patient. I wanted to secure him and get oxygen on him. So...I lost the pants and boots and climbed down behind him. I felt I had a secure purchase point and could sit behind him and give him a "bear hug" ergo stabilizing him and prevent him from going in the river if he collapsed. I told him with me behind and his hands in front grasping the limb, I felt like we were at the carnival on a ride.

I had a radio. Yea, no reception. We were simply in a hole. So there I sat, knowing help would come, but also knowing it was going to take time. Jimmy stayed until we finally heard the Highland Lake guys. I was quite happy to see Dave and Warren and company. Dave handed me two life jackets and I got one on myself and my new friend, Tom the fisherman.

And then appearing out of nowhere comes Bosco. If you know our history, Bosco and I have found ourselves in many a precarious situation. I was glad to see him. He literally came up the path and slid "Bosco style" (ape man swing) in the front of the patient so we now had Tom locked between us. Bosco made him laugh, we told stories, we learned a little bit about our patient. I believe we were there almost two hours before the technical team made it to us. We could not move Tom without further hurting him, however, if the river came up, we had a plan. I had asked Highland Lake to bring in a device normally used for automobile extrication. It's a short vest like affair that immobilizes a person neck and spine, but it also harnesses the hips. We figured we'd put that on him and haul him up if we had to. We did contact Eagle Creek to lower the river. But that takes time.

The technical guys were on the same page about lifting Tom, and we actually did use the extrication device. But they had the straps and webbing to assure comfort and safety. Tom was finally lifted back to land. He was secured in a stokes basket and hand carried over the ravine to the next obstacle, the long 150 foot incline that we had skittered down. A belay rope system had been arranged. Slowly Tom was hauled to the top of the incline and was carried to the next point. I was surprised to see a 4 wheeler had made it so far in. I later learned Lou cut a path wide enough for it. Now there were lots of people to help and a clear and distinct path! Paramedics arrived, Tom was further stabilized, and given his advanced age and history, we decided to fly him to a trauma center.

As we came out of the woods, the scope of the event really made me look twice. The event was huge! And required lots of man (and woman) power. It needed many of our mutual aid companies to handle traffic, response vehicles and keep you all safe while we all were helping Tom! I am grateful for my comrades. And so very awed by the skills and mutual aid that we have just a phone call away. By the way we had a third call during all this, handled by our Chief, Eric and Terry! (Terry wears at least a dozen hats in the department!)

The helicopter landed at the old Tri State Diesel. Tom was loaded and I said goodbye. He was a wonderful, nice man. I am glad things turned out so well. Go teams!

P.S. I ruined my socks, think I should put in for a new pair? :)


Transportation Section



HOW NY-ALERT WORKS



Sign Up Today

NY-ALERT is free and subscription-based. If you wish to receive emergency information, you can register at the NY-ALERT website at

www.nyalert.gov


Your email address will be your identifier. When you register, you can list up to three phone numbers, up to three email addresses, and one SMS device (for text messages). Most alerts are issued locally by your county or local municipality. Local officials will determine when to issue an alert and what devices to send alerts to. You may receive information on all of the devices you registered, or just one. Each emergency is different; therefore, each alert will be tailored to meet the notification needs of the incident. If you do not have access to the worldwide web, you may still sign up for NY-ALERT by calling

1-888-697-6972

You also will be able to select the locations from which you want to receive the information: your town or village, county, regions of the State or the entire state itself. However, if you select a large geographic area, you will receive all of the alerts, media releases and other information regarding those areas.

While NY-ALERT will transmit information almost instantaneously utilizing all appropriate gateways simultaneously, there is no 100 percent guarantee that the information will be received in a timely manner because the existing third party infrastructure may be unavailable (such as SMS, faxing and phone lines).

Be Prepared

Receiving emergency information is an important step to being prepared as an individual, a family and a community. Just as important is knowing what to do, how to do it, and when to do it.

In addition to receiving emergency information through NY-ALERT, two actions that you can take to become better prepared to protect yourself and your family are to develop an emergency plan and prepare a portable cache of emergency supplies that can be used at home or at work.



NY-ALERT

Welcome to NY-ALERT, New York State's All-Hazards Alert and Notification System. This web-based portal offers one-stop shopping through which State agencies, county and local governments, emergency service agencies and institutions of higher learning can provide emergency information to a defined audience be it local, county, regional or statewide.

Now you can receive emergency information such as major road closures and weather events at home, work or on the go. And you can receive that information the way you choose: via email; telephone call at home, at work or through your cellular device; Simple Message Service (SMS) text message; fax; pager; and on the web through your RSS (Really Simple Syndicate) Reader or by visiting the NY-ALERT website at www.nyalert.gov.

The information being provided by State agencies and local governments can be of pending events, such as National Weather Service alerts of snowstorms, tornadoes or severe weather; consequential actions such as road closures caused by those events; and protective actions that are recommended by State, local governments, colleges, universities, and the private sector where appropriate.



How NY-ALERT Works: Notification Gateways

The alerting portion of this portal uses many communications technologies to reach the public. The portal will disseminate emergency information through:

- Activation of EAS (Emergency Alert System);
- Blast faxes—to all subscribers who requested this gateway;
- Email message to media, business and individual subscribers
- Really Simple Syndicate (RSS) feeds posted to the website, through which people with RSS readers will automatically receive information;
- Text messages or Simple Message Service (SMS) via cell phones and pagers;
- Postings to the NY-ALERT website;
- Press releases to targeted media generated from the NY-ALERT portal;
- Dial-out recorded messages to subscriber phone numbers.

State and local agencies, through the county emergency manager, will be able to create incident-specific emergency messages to the targeted audiences/public, or take advantage of alert messages routinely provided by agencies to the public of impending weather and road closures (e.g. Thruway closures, National Weather Service warnings).

Secure Private Notifications

A secondary, but important feature allows governmental participants (State and local agencies) to provide private notifications to identified, select groups through the same secure web portal. This feature utilizes the fax, email, text message and dial out messaging. For example, a county sheriff could provide information to a group of local police chiefs; the county fire coordinator could provide information to local fire chiefs in a given region.


